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## *Background*

Born in Pittsburgh and raised in South Charleston, West Virginia. After receiving his Graduate Degree from Ohio State University, he spent two years in Algeria with International Volunteer Services.

At UCONN and UMC he managed doctoral and postdoctoral training programs in medical social science and social gerontology. His primary duties from 1969 to 1990 were to educate medical students and residents in family medicine and internal medicine in behavioral science and social gerontology. In 1986 he was awarded a one-year Mid-career Fellowship at the Institute for Health and Aging, UCSF.

After coming to Denton Texas in 1990, he was asked to establish the Texas Institute for Research and Education for Aging for UNT and UNTHSC. In 1994, he was appointed to renew the outreach mission of the Center for Public Service in the School of Community Service.

In 1997, US-HUD awarded \$400, 000 and later \$150, 000 to create a Community Oriented Partnership Center at UNT for developing various community programs in public housing, sustainable or healthy neighborhoods, and after-school programs in Denton and in Dallas. In partnership with the Center for US/Mexico Alliance for Community Renewal this community work expanded into Mexico. In 1997, the *Sustainable Communities Review* was established to encourage such work in Texas and beyond.
